Utilize a variety of instructional and learning strategies, including, but not limited to: lectures, use of audio-visual media such as PowerPoint, slides, films/videos, and, whenever necessary, the Internet. Organize student debates and discussion groups on key political issues such as equal or proportional representation in the legislative, executive and judiciary branches of the government. Work with students to analyze the causal and relational relationship of certain key variables such as funding of education or healthcare that limit equal participation politically and/or economically. Utilizing primary and secondary sources such as constitutions, human rights charters, and international treaties on the environment, students will undertake political actions by writing letters to political leaders to take appropriate actions (This activity is designed to develop critical thinking and problem-solving skills). 	 Students must demonstrate: Mastery and comprehension of materials from the assigned textbook(s) and academic research journals by performance on tests/exams at a level of at least 85%. Critical thinking and problem-skills through active participation in class discussions, debates, and group projects, and submission of written reports; Analytical and critical thinking skills in reading and interpreting primary and secondary sources, dealing with particular political issues. Ability to identify a political issue and undertake political action to resolve it. Ability to produce political science research paper of ten (10) pages. Ability for planning and presenting a research report to the class.
